Author(s)	Title of Resource	Title of Article	Publication Date

Note: If a student is hand writing the Works Cited document the title may be underlined because it may be difficult to write in italics.

Book with one author:

Clayton, Peter A. *The Valley of the Kings*. 1995.

Book with more than one author:

-- Choose the first author's name listed

Book with an editor (no author):

Dersin, Denise, ed. *What Life Was Like on the Banks of the Nile*. 1996.

Article in a magazine:

Hill, Margaret A. "Pyramid Engineering Secrets." *Odyssey*. March 2005.

Single or Multi-volume encyclopedia, atlas, dictionary or other reference resource – with or without an article author:

"Famous Pharaohs." *The Encyclopedia of Ancient History*. 2000 ed.

"Egypt, Ancient." *World Book Encyclopedia*. 2001 ed.

Online encyclopedia or reference resource:
